News

Recently Ginninderry welcomed the new Invertigro wall (invertigro.com) to The Link building. Café Stepping Stone, Strathnairn Arts Association's cafe, has already been able to use two basketfuls of kale, mizuna, basil and radishes harvested from this wall. Year 9 and 10 students from the local Kingsford Smith School will also be visiting once a month to learn how to look after the plants using this system.

In August we also welcomed the Creativity and Wellbeing Project, from the University of Canberra, to Ginninderry. The people behind this Project helped deliver the recent Haig Park experiments and are specialist researchers in the areas of play and open spaces. You may have met them at the latest Coffee Catch-up where they brought a faerie along who helped the children there write and post some very creative letters! The Play Creativity and Wellbeing Project team will be looking at the open spaces around Ginninderry over the next 18 months to help us create great play spaces in this suburb. Construction Update

114 blocks in the second stage of Strathnairn have now been completed for the owners to start their builds.

One of the key features of this next stage will be the Hilltop park and the promenade. The Huon team, together with Calibre, have collaborated very well on the complex design of an elevated promenade consisting of 3.5m high gabion walls with a curved concrete wall and a set of stairs clad in yellow quartzite. This will set the scene for a second neighbourhood park in Strathnairn which will be open to the public mid 2021.

The first neighbourhood park is nearly complete! Driving by you may notice much of the construction work is nearly complete. This park is hoped to be ready for the public by the end of November, stay tuned for an opening event to mark the occasion.

Fencing

A reminder that once you've purchased your block, it is no longer the responsibility of the developer. To ensure your block is protected and to reduce dumping on your site, we recommend installing fencing around your block. If you need assistance finding a fencing provider please don't hesitate to contact myself or the sales team.

In the ACT the verge is the responsibility of the residents. You can find out more about this on the Access Canberra website. We encourage you to maintain your verge to keep Strathnairn beautiful!

Rubbish

In Strathnairn, waste pick up happens on Thursdays. If you are having difficulties with pick-up contact Suez on 02 6260 1547. Also make sure to bring your bins in after they have been emptied.

Keep Active

There are electric bikes for hire (free for the first two hours) at The Link building. If you need help logging on please ask staff at The Link building.

Drake Brockman Drive can get busy with construction traffic, if you can remind your builder to be mindful of other users of this road it would assist those living on this primary connector road.

A new walking track which will begin from The Link building, skirt around the edge of the Conservation Corridor and continue for 3.2km to Shepherds Lookout, is coming in the first half of 2021. It will take in some and varied terrain and stunning views across a spectacular landscape.

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Pets at Strathnairn

As Strathnairn is next door to the Ginninderry Conservation Corridor there are some special guidelines for pets in this suburb. Jess Stewart, Ginninderry's Sustainability Manager explains more.

Cats

Strathnairn has been identified by the ACT Government as a Cat Containment Area. This means that your cat must always be kept within your premises and must not be allowed to roam.

A Cat Containment Area is any area within the ACT in which cats have been deemed by the ACT Government to be a serious threat to the native flora or fauna within the area. Cats, when allowed to roam, are natural hunters and have been shown to hunt and kill a wide variety of native and non-native wildlife.

If your cat is found roaming, rangers can seize your cat and you can be fined up to \$1,500.

If you see a cat roaming within Strathnairn or the Ginninderry Conservation Corridor, you can contact the ACT Government's Domestic Animal Services (DAS) on 13 22 81 or via dogcontrol@act.gov.au. Cats can also be brought to RSPCA ACT or to a nearby veterinarian.

Ginninderry has been designed to conserve and protect the natural

environment. It is important that we all do what we can to support this natural habitat to allow the animals who live there to thrive.

If you're thinking of installing a cat enclosure at your home then have a look at the GX Display Village Cat Enclosure Demonstration or grab a factsheet from The Link.

Dogs

Did you know that dogs must be kept on a leash at all times unless you are within a designated off-leash area?

Dogs must also be kept 10 metres away from playgrounds and public BBQ areas.

Dogs are also prohibited within the Ginninderry Conservation Corridor. This is because of our commitment to protecting the natural environment around Ginninderry.

If you are walking your dog off-lead or are found in a prohibited area, you may receive a \$150 on-the-spot fine or a penalty of up to \$2,400.

Please also clean up after you dog and place your doggie poo in a public bin, or take it home.

In a growing suburb there is a lot of ground-work to do before a new house can be built and open green spaces established. To enable the Trust to deliver the outcomes outlined in our Management Plan (which you can find on the Ginninderry website) we have recently engaged Tyson Powell, a local Ngunnawal-Wiradjuri man, in a project officer role. Tyson will undertake land management activities, community engagement and cultural heritage projects within the Conservation Corridor.

We are also very pleased that our temporary reporting officer, Rachel Eland, has agreed to stay on permanently as our rehabilitation and reporting officer.

We extend a warm welcome to both Tyson and Rachel who have hit the ground running and are currently working on several projects including upcoming workshops, reporting, habitat restoration and bush tucker gardens. If you see Rachel and Tyson around, please say g'day.

We've also been really excited to start our arts/environment workshops, called 'My Place' with the theme 'from little things, big things grow' to quote the very talented Paul Kelly! This is a series of four 1.5 hour workshops, every three weeks commencing Saturday 29th August 2020, for 7-12 year olds. We are investigating seeds, seedlings, mature trees and habitat hollows through hands on activities in the Conservation Corridor plus drawing and story-telling.

As well as this the Conservation Corridor be hosting another Bird and Plant walk with Nicki Taws from Greening Australia as part of the 'Month of Wildlife' activities in partnership with the Ginninderry community, Waterwatch, Greening Australia and Frogwatch.

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Wrap your ears around your suburb after dark!



When it comes to Ginninderry you might know where to find Keach Close, but have you located the key frog habitats yet?

Frogs will advertise their prime 'realestate' by making lots and lots of frog noises during their breeding season. Most frogs are nocturnal, which means active at night, so the best time to listen to frogs is after dark. Having said this, a few local species can be sometimes heard singing during the day as well. Each frog species has a unique call, which makes it easy to identify them. Frogs are important indicator species for the health of our environment, and are protected by law, so you can watch and listen for them, but it is best not to touch them.

Only two frog species, the tiny Common Eastern Froglet and the Whistling Tree Frog, are calling over winter but once temperatures start to rise, others will join the chorus, so now is a great time to learn to identify calls and extend your frog sound library, one species at a time. If you want to get an expert identification on a frog call you can record and submit the call to Canberra Nature Map. This fantastic resource will also give you an understanding of the frogs in your area.
