Construction update

Some open spaces around the suburb are nearly ready to start the handover process to ACT Government. You'll note these are currently fenced, which we have done for your safety as we cannot guarantee that the areas are suitable for use until Transport Canberra and City Services (TCCS) completes its process. We expect the fenced open spaces to be submitted for Operational Acceptance in October and should be open soon after. If you enter before the fences are removed, please note that you do so at your own risk.

As suburbs are constructed and landscaped, assets are transferred to the ACT Government. All completed roads, verges and public areas are generally managed by TCCS, even before owners start building. As in any suburb, any infrastructure (e.g. footpaths), parking, traffic, noise and other matters should be brought to the attention of TCCS through Access Canberra (www.accesscanberra. act.gov.au). While Ginninderry strives to deliver a high-quality suburb, we are not permitted to act on matters under the government's authority.

All of our suburbs go through a design process led by the Ginninderry project team. We ensure there are opportunities for our community, including our current and future residents, to have input on these designs so that we can share in achieving the best possible outcome. While we're working on an online platform, joining an Advisory Group session is another way to contribute. Fencina

A continual reminder that once you've purchased your block, ownership passes to you, and it is no longer the responsibility of the developer. To ensure your block is protected and to reduce dumping on your site, we recommend installing fencing around your block ASAP. If you need assistance finding a fencing provider, please don't hesitate to contact myself or the sales team.

In the ACT the verge is the responsibility of the residents. This includes grass areas and where there are planted areas & trees. You can find out more about this on the Access Canberra website. We encourage you to maintain your verge to keep Strathnairn beautiful!

School Site

Following consultation undertaken in February, a development application (DA) has now been prepared and submitted to create the appropriate zoning for the Strathnairn Primary School and adjoining open space. The DA is an Estate Development Plan (EDP), more commonly known as a subdivision application. The EDP has been submitted to the ACT Planning Authority for Review by ACT Government agencies before formal DA submission. This is typically a process that takes 3 - 6 months. Once the government agencies are comfortable that the documentation submitted satisfies their requirements for assessment the Planning Authority will formally accept the DA and the DA will be placed on public notification, which is when the public will have an opportunity to make comments.

Once rezoned, ACT Education will submit a separate DA for the development of the school. Ginninderry understands that ACT Education is working toward submitting their DA for the school design in 2023. At this point, the DA will be available for public comment through the required assessment process.

Rubbish

In Strathnairn, waste collection happens on Thursdays. If you are having difficulties with pick-up, contact Suez on 02 6260 1547. Also, make sure to bring your bins in after they have been emptied. If you notice any illegal dumping, please contact Access Canberra on 13 22 81.

If you notice any ongoing issues regarding traffic around Strathnairn, please note the time and location and report the issue to Fix My Street. Drake Brockman Drive can get busy with construction traffic, so if you can remind your builder to be mindful of other users of this road, it would assist those living on this primary connector road.

Ginninderry has been designed to prioritise pedestrians and cyclists with wide paths allowing good connectivity across the suburb. There are electric bikes for hire (free for the first two hours) at The Link building. Go to ginninderry.bykko.net to log in to the hire service.



Conservation Corridor

Ninja Turtle Rescuers – translocating turtles into the Corridor.

The Trust, alongside the Ginninderry project team, Ginninderra Waterwatch and Huon, have been collaborating to help translocate Eastern long-necked Turtles from dams in the new suburb of Macnamara. As these dams are being dewatered, the Trust team have been having fun wading into some cold, muddy water to capture all of the turtles. With two dams emptied so far, the team worked with Bruno from Ginninderra Waterwatch to move 64 turtles to their new home in the Corridor. Turtles were translocated to dams that are close to other waterways so that when it's time to move, they have easy access to pathways.

Winter is the perfect time to undertake turtle translocation work. As the water temperatures drop below 8 degrees, the turtles become inactive. During this time, the turtles will go into a state of hibernation and will stay at the bottom of a dam until early September.

When the spring rains begin, it is the signal for the turtles, especially the Eastern long-necked turtle, to start feeding and migrate to colonise new wetlands. This species evolved the ability for this type of movement to take advantage of the increased productivity of ephemeral wetlands, which occur in natural, rural, and urban areas. To help protect the turtles during their migration, they have pronounced odour glands that release a foul smell when the turtle is disturbed.

The two dams that have been sampled to date have revealed a healthy population, with turtles ranging from 60 years old to juveniles around 5 years old. So far, the population seems to have a higher number of females which could be a result of males moving more through the landscape, resulting in higher mortality rates by predation or roads. Further investigation is required to determine why there are fewer males.

The Trust would like to thank members of the Ginninderry team, Café Stepping Stone and Bruno for their help cleaning and translocating the turtles.

During hibernation, a turtle's metabolism is significantly reduced, allowing them to stop feeding while they wait out winter. While hibernating at the bottom of the dam, a turtle's oxygen needs are quite low, so they breathe through their cloaca. A cloaca, you ask. Well, it essentially means that turtles breathe through their bottoms! The oxygen that is in the water is enough to sustain them until spring.


