Every Friday morning from 9:30 am – 11 am Playgroups ACT run a free playgroup at The Link. This playgroup is open to everyone, so if you have friends in nearby suburbs, please let them know to pop down. We have a greenhouse!



The Caring for Country team has been busy putting together a greenhouse to facilitate the propagation of native species. This project started with the idea to grow plants for use as part of our revegetation projects. Our long-term vision is to grow plants for local residents to plant in their own gardens.

To date, the Caring for Country team have propagated 25+ species from seeds and cuttings collected from the Corridor, including trees, shrubs and groundcovers. Many of the groundcover species (grasses and forbs) have been propagated from our Scrape and Sow in the Corridor; an area 0.26ha in size that has been scraped back and sown with native grass and forb seeds. This site is in its fourth year now and provides a great example of a high-quality native grassland.

Did you know?

There are over 1000 types of Wattle (Acacia). The Acacia genus is the largest group of trees and shrubs in Australia! The distinctive yellow flowers and green leaves from the Golden Wattle (Acacia pycnantha) is where Australia draws its national colours - green and gold.

Species we're growing:

Trees

- Callitris endlicheri (Black Cypress Pine). First Nations people would use the resin as an adhesive and the wood to make canoe poles and fish spears.
- Casuarina cunninghamiana (River She-oak)

Shrubs

- Cassinia longfolia (Shiny Cassinia) leaves are very sticky and hold medicinal properties. They were traditionally used by First Nations people as a type of Band-Aid.
- Dodonaea viscosa (Hopbush) have been used to help toothaches (it is also known as toothache bush) as the leaves numb your mouth as you chew on them.
- Centipeda cunninghamii (Old Man Weed) is used as an immune booster and to treat various illnesses and as a cold and flu remedy.
- Indigofera australis (Austral Indigo) have been used to kill or stun fish and eels by adding crushed leaves into slow moving water.

Groundcover (grasses & forbs):

- Eryngium ovinum (Blue Devil)
- Arthropodium strictum (Chocolate Lily). The flowers smell like chocolate and the tuber provides a source of food.
- Bulbine bulbosa (Bulbine Lily) tubers also provide a source of food.
